# I. WELCOME AND SIGN IN

#### II. REVIEW / APPROVE MINUTES OF SEPTEMBER. 2025 MEETING

The minutes were distributed and read. Laurie Lewis moved to approve the minutes as submitted. Heather Johnson seconded the motion. The minutes were unanimously approved.

## III. PRINCIPAL UPDATE AND BUDGET

- a. Mr. Wilson reported that the Best Buddies program was honored at the last school board meeting as the BB Program of the Year in the County. The GRMS chapter will be visited by other schools wish to start a BB Club at their school.
- b. Mr. Wilson also reported that there is \$2405.10 in the SAC budget.

## IV. SCHOOL BOARD NEWS

- a. Ms. Jennifer Collins reported that the School Board and Superintendent are forming focus groups to meet once a month. She encouraged PTO and SAC members to attend. Also needed is a representative from GRMS.
- b. Ms. Collins also reported that the School Board is looking at rezoning. Opinions are welcome.
- c. Ms. Collins also reminded us that there will be a Track or Treat at the PMHS field on October 29. The PMHS will be renamed Bill Mignon Field at the next football game. Mr. Mignon was the first PMHS principal.

# VI. SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN

Mr. Wilson gave an overview of what the School Improvement Plan is.

- a. There are 902 students at GRMS, 24 more students than at the 10 day count. GRMS is a Title 1 school. The subgroup of Students with Disabilities scored 37% overall and has to go up to at least 40% to avoid federal intervention. There are fewer that 10 ELL (English Language Learners) in the school, making it too small to form a subgroup.
- b. What is the School Improvement Plan?
  - Required document outlining the school's goals that address the needs of their school
  - Developed by the school leadership team, led by the school principal
  - Principal finalizes and submits for approval to the district/state
  - Goals are based on data including:
    - o parent, student and teacher surveys
    - State testing data
    - o Teacher requests for programs
    - Other information that can assist in planning for the needs to have a strong and effective school

SAC is available to advise the principal, but the principal has the final decision on all components of the SIP.

- c. How does the SIP impact SAC?
  - The School Improvement Plan (SIP) is the driving force for decisions within SAC.
  - Once the principal finalizes the SIP, they must present the plan to the SAC during a meeting.
  - Each school will have Areas of Focus. These are the goals for the year that should be the focus of SAC as the school year progresses.
  - All fund requests must directly align to the Areas of Focus addressed in the SIP

#### d. Areas of Focus

Focus 1

Implementation of Small Group Instruction in Standard ELA classes
Use of a Literacy Coach in ESE and VE (Varying Exceptionalities)

Focus 2

Implementation of PLC (Professional Learning Communities):

1st and 3rd Wednesdays are used for Teacher Planning

2<sup>nd</sup> Wednesday is used for school-based learning groups

4<sup>th</sup> Wednesday is a "district" driven day

Focus 3

**Non-Academic Behavior** 

14% of students last year were given OSS (Out of School Suspension) goal is to lower the percentage to 10% or less

PBIS Posters have been created by staff during pre-planning and are all over the school to reinforce positive behavior. Tickets are given out to students who demonstrate good behavior.

Rewards include: Rolling cart from which students can purchase doodads, Tardy Party (for students who have no tardies), Quarterly Field Days, Quarterly Drawings for prizes

Focus 4

Intervention strategies

Behavior Interventionist meets with students and contacts parents Formation of small groups to address common negative behavior

SIPS are constructed based pm School Goals and Needs, Parent/Staff surveys, testing data, Teacher Requests.

SIPS can be tweaked if necessary.
